

## **City of Durham Parliamentary Constituency**

This is the first bulletin of 2013 produced by Northern Housing Consortium (NHC) providing analysis of housing-related data for the Parliamentary Constituencies in the North of England. The report provides analysis of housing supply and the economy and welfare reforms in the constituency.

## **Housing Supply and the Economy**



In the final quarter of 2012, there were 190 new dwelling starts and 250 dwelling completions in County Durham. Ten starts were in the social sector while all completions were in the private sector. Dwelling starts have fallen from 260 in the previous quarter but risen from 150 in the corresponding quarter in 2011.




Research by Northern Housing Consortium and Sheffield Hallam University into the contribution housing makes to the <u>economy in the north</u> shows that £10.3bn worth of output expenditure was made in the North in 2011/12. It is estimated that Durham City Homes supported £29.7 million worth of expenditure and supported 610 FTE jobs in the North East.



Recently released figures show that there are a total of 1,906 unemployed in the constituency (2.7% of the working aged population). This represents an 8.5% reduction on the same point in 2012. Some 3.7% of working-aged males and 1.8% of their female counterparts were claiming unemployment benefits in March 2013 and while male figures fell by 8.6% on the previous year, figures for females fell by 8.3% in the same period.



ONS data shows a higher proportion of smaller households with two-thirds of households (67.3%) having either one or two people living in them. Three-person households make up 15.7% of households. Figure 1 below shows the proportions of all households in the constituency and how this compares with regional figures.



## Welfare



The 2011 Census reports that 29,688 households (77.9%) now under-occupy their home in the constituency. A study by Sheffield Hallam University reported in the <u>Financial Times</u> shows that 8,700 households in County Durham will be affected by the 'bedroom tax' with an estimated £5.9m loss per year.




In last year's first edition of the constituency profiles we reported that 6,240 households receiving Housing Benefit in the constituency. In November 2012, there were 6,600 such claimants. This is 17.3% of all households in the constituency and a 5.8% increase on the 6,240 reported last year.



Annual Survey of Hours and Earnings (ASHE) for 2012 shows that in City of Durham constituency, the median weekly pay is £423.90. This represents an increase of 7.1% on the previous year. Full-time pay has increased by 4.1% over the preceding twelve months.



Notwithstanding this overall increase, Campaign to End Child Poverty 2012 data shows that in City of Durham, 3,311 children live in poverty – 21% of the child population in the constituency. Map 1 shows child poverty by ward and that the worst affected ward is Gilesgate (41%).
