

Cheadle Parliamentary Constituency

This is the first bulletin of 2013 produced by Northern Housing Consortium (NHC) providing analysis of housing-related data for the Parliamentary Constituencies in the North of England. The report provides analysis of housing supply and the economy and welfare reforms in the constituency.

We have used the following symbols to indicate your performance against the relevant regional or national statistics.







Housing Supply and the Economy

In the final quarter of 2012, there were 10 new dwelling starts and 20 dwelling completions in Stockport. All starts and completions were in the private sector. Dwelling starts have risen from 20 in the previous quarter and from a similar level in the corresponding quarter in 2011.




Research by Northern Housing Consortium and Sheffield Hallam University into the contribution housing makes to the <u>economy in the north</u> shows that £10.3bn worth of output expenditure was made in the North in 2011/12. It is estimated that Stockport Homes supported £41.055 million worth of expenditure and supported 521 FTE jobs in the North West.

Recently released figures show that there are a total of 1,071 unemployed in the constituency (1.9% of the working aged population). This represents a 10.9% reduction on the same point in 2012. Some 2.7% of working-aged males and 1.1% of their female counterparts were claiming unemployment benefits in March 2013 and while male figures fell by 10.5% on the previous year, figures for females fell by 11.9% in the same



period.

ONS data shows a higher proportion of smaller households with almost two-thirds of households (62.7%) having either one or two people living in them. Three-person households make up 15.7% of households. Figure 1 below shows the proportions of all households in the constituency and how this compares with regional figures.



Welfare



The 2011 Census reports that 30,727 households (81.8%) now under-occupy their home in the constituency. A study by Sheffield Hallam University reported in the <u>Financial Times</u> shows that 3,300 households in Stockport will be affected by the 'bedroom tax' with an estimated $\pounds2.4m$ loss per year.


In last year's first edition of the constituency profiles we reported that 2,760 households receiving Housing Benefit in the constituency. In November 2012, there were 2,890 such claimants. This is 7.7% of all households in the constituency and a 4.7% increase on the 2,760 reported last year.



Annual Survey of Hours and Earnings (ASHE) for 2012 shows that in Cheadle constituency, the median weekly pay is £412.60. This represents a decrease of 2.4% on the previous year. Full-time pay has increased by 10.8% and part-time pay by 13.1%.



Notwithstanding this overall increase, Campaign to End Child Poverty 2012 data shows that in Cheadle, 1,599 children live in poverty – 8% of the child population in the constituency. Map 1 shows child poverty by ward and that the worst affected ward is Cheadle Hulme North (13%).
