

Preston Parliamentary Constituency

This is the first bulletin of 2014 produced by Northern Housing Consortium (NHC) providing analysis of housing-related data for the Parliamentary Constituencies in the North of England. The report provides analysis of the impacts of welfare reform and the housing market in the constituency.

Welfare Reform



The third <u>Real Life Reform</u> report found an increase in the average debt of respondents taking part in the study (£3,503) with debt repayments increasing by 58% since October. 46% of participants report having nothing left each week to live on once rent and essentials such as food and bills have been paid.




Last year we reported that in the constituency, 6,268 children live in poverty – 29% of the child population in the constituency. According to figures by The Children's Society, 5,028 children in poverty are estimated to miss out on the <u>warm home discount</u> in the constituency.



A number of sources report that households affected by the spare room subsidy cannot move due to a lack of suitable accommodation. In the first three quarters of 2013/14, there were 735 general needs lettings in Preston (CORE data). This compares to 681 lettings in the same period of 2012/13 (a 7.9% increase). Lettings of one-bedroom properties grew by 5.6% (Q3 2013/14 compared to Q3 2012/13).



Data released by the Department of Communities and Local Government in October shows that a total of £246,193 was allocated to Preston Council in Discretionary Housing Payment funding. Of that, £111,960 has been committed (45.5%). The greatest demand on this (£57,937) was to support 248 households affected by the removal of spare room subsidy in the social rented sector.



Housing Market



The Chancellor announced in his Budget Statement that the Help to Buy Equity Loan scheme will be extended until March 2020. Since its launch on 1st April 2013 to the end of February 2014, 15 homes have been bought in Preston with support of the scheme. This equates to 3.9% of the 383 completed equity loans in Lancashire.




Average house prices in Lancashire in February 2014 stood at £104,647 a decrease of 0.6% on the same period in 2013. This is despite sales volumes being on a general upward trend, ending on 1,550 in December 2013 compared with 1,169 in December 2012.



Vacant dwellings have been on a general downward trend since 2008. In October 2013 there were a total of 2,193 vacant dwellings in Preston compared with 2,491 in 2008. Of the 2013 figure, 51 were owned by housing associations. Long-term vacants have fallen by 28.6% since 2008.



In 2012/13, Preston Council made a total of 83 homeless decisions. Of these, 54 applicants were accepted as being homeless and in priority need (65.1%). The number accepted as being homeless equates to 0.93 per 1,000 households in the borough – down from 0.98 in 2011/12 but up from 0.84 in 2010/11.
