

Morecambe and Lunesdale Parliamentary Constituency

This is the second bulletin of 2015 produced by Northern Housing Consortium (NHC) providing analysis of housing-related data for the Parliamentary Constituencies in the North of England. The report provides analysis of the impacts of welfare reform and the housing market in the constituency.

ONS figures show that in the year ending in June 2015, there were 34,000 people aged over 16 years old in employment (64%) in Morecambe and Lunesdale. There are 34,000 jobs in the constituency which equates to 0.64 jobs per 16-64 year old compared to 0.77 across the North West.



Experimental Jobseekers Allowance and out of work Universal Credit statistics produced by Jobcentre Plus shows that there were 1,325 such claimants in November 2015 (2.5% of 16-64 year olds), which is a 0.1% increase on the previous year. This compares to 2.4% of people in the region (a 0.1% increase).



The latest Government data shows that there were 19,285 children in low income families in the constituency in August 2013 (19.3% of all children). Over four-fifths were in families in receipt of Income Support or Jobseekers Allowance while 13.2%, in families in receipt of Council Tax Credit and with less than 60% of median income.



Heysham North ward (32.5%) had the greatest concentration of such children followed by Skerton West (29.7%). Skerton West also has a higher than average proportion of children living in a family in receipt of Income Support or JSA (90.5%).

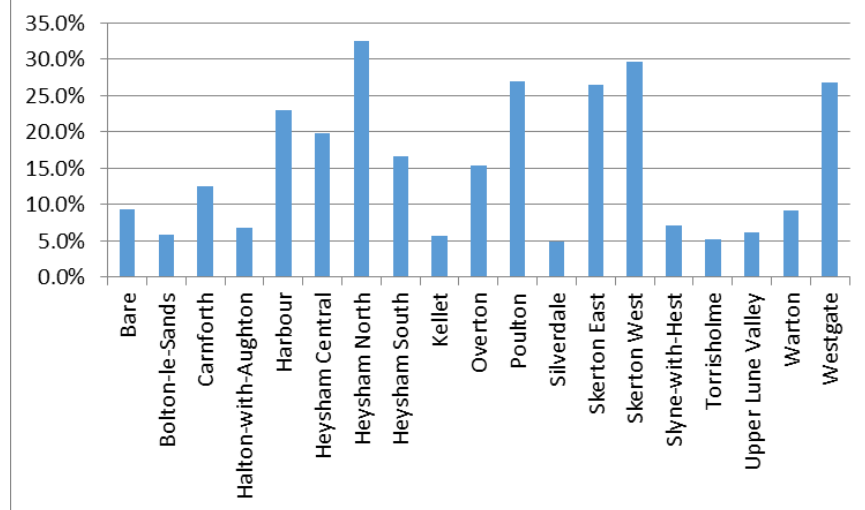


Figure 1: Percentage of children in low income families

Housing Market



In 2014/15, there were 73 homeless acceptances by Lancaster City Council which is a 43.8% decrease on the 2009/10 figure of 130. A total of 6 households were found temporary accommodation and there were 18 households that were not found accommodation at the end of March 2015 despite a duty being owed.



In October 2014, the total number of vacant homes was 2,274. This is an 11% decrease from 2,556 in 2009 compared with the 24.7% decrease in Lancashire. Long-term vacants fell by 2.2% over the same period. There was a total of 186 social vacants and 5 were classed as long-term vacant (2.7%).



As at April 2014, there were 2,641 households on the housing waiting list in Lancaster City. This is a 37.1% increase on the previous year 1,927. Furthermore, this figure represented a rise on previous years and the long-term trend is a 10.1% increase on 2009 figures.



There are signs that the housing market is recovering. There was an increase in sales between 2009 and 2014 (30.1%) with greatest increase in sales of terraced properties (ONS). The data also shows median house prices reached their highest level since 2007 (£132,000).



As figure 2 shows, median house prices and pay have not grown at the same rate. Median house prices grew while median gross pay (ASHE) fell in 2014. As a result, the affordability ratio grew to 7.1 from 6.5 between 2013 and 2014.
