

Wyre and Preston North Parliamentary Constituency

This is the second bulletin of 2016 produced by Northern Housing Consortium (NHC) providing analysis of housing-related data for the Parliamentary Constituencies in the North of England. The report provides analysis of the impacts of welfare reform and the housing market in the constituency.

We have used the following symbols to indicate your performance against the relevant regional or national statistics.







Private rented sector



Valuation Office Agency data shows that in Wyre LA area there were 850 private rents between 1st October 2015 and 30th September 2016. This is out of a total of 16,470 in Lancashire (5.2%).




The most popular private property size was two-bedroom (370) followed by three-bedroom (250) and one-bedroom (150).



Figure 1 below shows the average private rent for different property sizes and the corresponding Local Housing Allowance (LHA) rates for the Central Lancs Broad Rental Market Area (BRMA). It shows that average rents outstrips the LHA rate and can range from £79.62 for shared accommodation to over £204 for larger properties.



DWP data shows that in August, LHA claimants in the constituency were most likely to live in one-bedroom properties (451), followed by properties with two bedrooms (401).



LHA and Supported Housing



As Figure 2 below shows, LHA rates for the Central Lancs BRMA range from £53.67 for shared accommodation to £161 for four bedroom accommodation.



LHA awarded to single people aged below 35 will be restricted to the shared accommodation rate. This is to encourage single people younger than 35 years old to share accommodation which will in turn lead to empty properties elsewhere. Using the average supported rent as a benchmark, this leaves this cohort £37.61 short on their rent.




Furthermore, the Statistical Data Return (SDR) shows that there are 642 housing association-owned supported units in Wyre owned by large housing associations with an average net weekly rent being £91.33. This is well above the weekly LHA rate for shared accommodation of £53.67. Therefore, where private rents are cheaper, LHA may not cover supported accommodation costs but will in more expensive areas.



This is causing concern for housing providers with reports that new supported schemes are being put on hold until there is more certainty over how local authorities will administer the fund to top up the cost of supported housing from Government.



Large housing associations own 3,576 units in Wyre. Introducing a regulatory fee of £5 per property to large associations would equate to a cost of £17,880. Furthermore, using average rents and a 52 week rent year, these associations also face a £165,981 fall in rental income in the first year of the 1% rent reduction for stock in Wyre alone.
