

- “Can’t achieve net zero without local authorities”
- 280 Local Authorities have declared a Climate Emergency
- Public support strong action on climate change and air pollution
- Net zero offers huge co-benefits

- Grant Local Authorities and Mayors the powers and funding they need to deliver zero emission transport networks.
- Create certainty for business and local government by setting out an ambitious roadmap to 2030.




UK is committed to net zero by 2050

- Tackling climate change and achieving net zero is a key Government priority
- The UK is a world leader in cutting emissions, achieving the best performance in the G7 on a per person basis between 1990 and 2017
- The UK over-achieved against the first (2008-12) and second (2013-17) carbon budgets, and is on track to meet the third (2018-22)
- We recognise the need for further action to meet the fourth (2023-27) and fifth (2028-32) carbon budgets
- Committee on Climate Change will be advising on the sixth carbon budget (2033–37) in December 2020, the first since net zero adopted
- In 2020-21, ahead of hosting COP26, we will bring forward ambitious new plans to reduce emissions across key sectors of the economy
- COP26 UK Mayors and Regions Advisory Council - engage with local leaders from across the UK to engage communities in the run-up to COP.

Green economic recovery is a priority

- As we recover from COVID-19, the Government intends to deliver a UK economy which is stronger, cleaner, more sustainable and more resilient
- Tackling climate change will be a win-win. Many of the actions we need to take to reach net zero will also support our economic recovery


Funding is available from government

- BEIS already provides a range of policy and financial support for low carbon projects
- Green recovery funding announced over the summer included the following programmes which will support around 140,000 jobs:
 - £1 billion over the next year for a new Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme to upgrade public sector buildings
 - £2 billion 'Green Homes Grant', which will upgrade more than 600,000 homes in England and save households up to £600 a year
 - £50m demonstrator project for decarbonisation of social housing, which will encourage innovation and inform design of the future Social Housing Decarbonisation Fund
- Spending Review was announced by the Chancellor at the end of July, and is currently underway




- The Local Climate and Energy team's role is to support LEPs, local authorities and communities in England to play a leading role in net zero and clean growth

Impacts of flooding

- high variation in experience
- short & longer term negative impacts
- more vulnerable groups: children, older people, living alone, pre-existing stressful life events or medical conditions

Increased stress


- impacting home life & personal relationships
- anxiety, tiredness, sleeplessness, low, overwhelmed
- delay in moving back home, temporary accommodation, builders
- most did not seek professional help
- most of those negatively affected had pre-existing mental wellbeing problems

Indoor air quality

- indoor air can be worse than outdoors
- increasing traffic on roads, more time spent indoors
- hotter drier summers - increase in photochemical smog episodes
- energy efficiency measures increase air tightness of buildings
- with inadequate ventilation harmful pollutants build up - reducing indoor air quality






